Sustainability strategy for the development of sector skills councils in Jamaica

Background

The government of Jamaica and the Private Sector Organisation of Jamaica (PSOJ) have identified the agribusiness, logistics, and manufacturing sectors as having significant growth and productivity potential. To maximise on this opportunity its critical that the skills of the workforce are developed aligned to industry demands and employment prospects, particularly for young people.

People 1st International partnered with their clients to explore the feasibility of implementing a sector skills council (SSC) model in these industries to help enhance skills development in these growth sectors.

Our solutions

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We conducted research and consultations with key stakeholders within each of the priority sectors to identify the current and future skill needs and challenges faced by companies in the industry.

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Our findings informed the development of sector profiles to provide valuable insights on the industry's regional significance, potential future job prospects, sought-after occupations and skills, career pathways for young individuals and opportunities for lifelong learning. We also demonstrated the connection between the sector profiles and the government of Jamaica's investment activities, showcasing how investments contribute to the identified growth areas.



By assessing existing alliances between companies and educational institutions, including public-private collaborations in work-based learning, we provided valuable insights for improvement. A series of recommendations were developed to outline the routes to establish a sustainable skills development ecosystem for the prioritised sectors, with a particular focus on creating sector skills councils.

Outcomes and Impact

We presented a strong business case for three new SSCs in logistics, agribusiness and manufacturing that will enhance operational efficiency, reduce costs and foster collaboration amongst industry. The terms of reference emphasised the strategic importance of these SSCs in transforming the industries and driving foreign investment. It also demonstrated that approving their establishment would facilitate job creation, improve service delivery, and position the nation as a regional hub for business operations in these sectors.

By supporting the proposed members of the SSCs to develop short, medium, and long-term skills action plans, we helped to set priorities that will address the specific skill requirements of each sector and ensure a steady supply of qualified professionals.

Ultimately, our findings highlighted that prioritising skills development in these sectors and aligning ongoing activities of the SSCs to changing industry needs will help deliver a qualified workforce that meets the demands of the industries, helping to enhance productivity and contribute to Jamaica's economic growth and competitiveness.




